Special Election Called Candidate filing open through March 7

At the January 19 meeting, the City Council adopted an ordinance calling for a special election to be held on May 7, 2016. The selection of former At-Large Councilmember Position 1 Andy Brauning as Mayor in December left an open seat on the Council dais.

Residents who meet the state and City Charter requirements may file an application for a place on the ballot in the City Secretary's office through March 7 at 5 p.m. Any qualified voter of the city of Huntsville may cast a ballot in this election, as At-Large Councilmember positions are selected citywide. The At-Large Position 1 Councilmember elected will serve the remainder of the current term, but will then have to run again in November this year, if they wish to try to retain the seat for its next term.

Candidate Packets for the 2015 City of Huntsville General Election are available through the office of the City Secretary at City Hall, 1212 Avenue M, or on the City web site at <http://www.huntsvilletx.gov/Elections>.

The City of Huntsville application fee is one dollar, per City Charter mandate. City Secretary Lee Woodward acknowledged members of the public may have questions about the responsibilities of Councilmembers.

"The City Secretary's office provides the candidate packets, which include general information, a brief of the state election calendar, and references for guidelines and statutes," Woodward said. "Anyone is welcome to learn more about the duties of Councilmembers and how the election process is conducted, even if they have no desire to run for office. The steps to becoming and the obligations of an elected Councilmember are many and varied."



Ken Holland, Police Chaplain



Ken Holland was recently named as the second Chaplain at the Huntsville Police Department (HPD). The primary role of the chaplain is to assist the officers in delivering death notifications. By providing families with immediate support, the on-scene officers are able to concentrate their efforts on the initial investigation. Additionally, the chaplains sometimes provide help to the City's Victim Assistance Coordinator when dealing with victims of violent crime, as well as aiding HPD employees when such needs arise.

Holland joins Jerry Phillips in performing such duties at HPD. Phillips, named as Chaplain a number of years ago, was sometimes unavailable due to other responsibilities or unexpected situations, leading Phillips to consider finding an additional chaplain. Ken Holland visited with Phillips when a situation occurred in his neighborhood, and was asked to assist at a death scene. Holland, too, had been considering ways to serve the public more.

"In my [administrative and operations] position at University Heights Baptist Church there are some opportunities to counsel and aid others," Holland said. "I had been looking for the right way to do a bit more and to do something out in the community at large, but wasn't sure what avenue it might take. Jerry and I have known each other for many years, when he was with TABC [Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission] and I was in the restaurant industry, and then later as we both worked with local churches. He gave me an inside look at what would be expected and how to best help our citizens and officers. It seemed a challenging way to answer needs in our community and provide a public service."



After attending Police Chaplain training and shadowing Chaplain Phillips, Holland says he now stands ready. Chief Lunsford said, "We appreciate both of these men for their dedication and willingness to advance HPD's Chaplain program."

Holland attended Sam Houston State University, initially studying criminal justice but graduating with a degree in business administration. After a number of years in the restaurant business and later with Motorola, he accepted a position with University Heights Baptist Church as the Minister of Administration. Holland was a member of the 2014 City U. program and is a member of the City's Hotel Occupancy Tax Board and Board of Adjustment-Zoning. He also serves on the TCLOSE Training Advisory Board of the Office of Inspector General for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice as a public member and is an incoming board member for the Huntsville/Walker County Chamber of Commerce.

"I can't thank Jerry enough for his mentorship," Holland said. "I have great respect for his experience and appreciate the trust he placed in me to offer this possibility initially. It is a pleasure to work with him and everyone at HPD."



How Texans Can Volunteer and Donate Responsibly

In the face of disaster, Texans have always come together with courage, compassion and unity to ask, “How can I help?” If you want to volunteer for disaster work, there are many tasks to do after a disaster— cleaning-up and re-building are two of the biggest. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) suggests that volunteering through a local voluntary organization may be the best way to find meaningful volunteer work after the disaster.

Such organizations are often in the best position to know about opportunities for volunteers in the long and difficult recovery phase. In addition, volunteering through an established organization provides a better chance of having insurance and liability protection when you work as a volunteer.

The Texas chapter of National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) is a good source of local organizations in need of volunteers. Texas VOAD represents more than three dozen faith-based, community, nonprofit and non-governmental groups that include volunteer engagement as a key component of their operations.

In the immediate disaster response period there are often many people who want to volunteer at the same time. Remember to be patient. It may not be clear until days after the incident how volunteers can get involved. There are often greater needs for volunteer help when the community enters the long-term recovery period. If you cannot volunteer your time or talent, FEMA officials say making a donation to an organization involved in disaster recovery is a sensible, efficient way of helping the people in need. Cash contributions to voluntary organizations make good sense for a number of reasons:

- Financial contributions help ensure a steady flow of important services to disaster survivors in need;
- Local organizations spend the money in the local disaster area, accelerating recovery of the local economy;
- Cash donations—rather than unsolicited donated goods—avoid the complicated, costly and time-consuming process of collecting, transporting and distributing the goods, and cash donations to recognized relief organizations are tax-deductible.

Showing up at a disaster site unexpectedly can create an additional burden for first responders. Volunteering and donating through existing channels, and making responsible decisions that do not hamper the recovery, is the best way

Proper Retirement of Flags

Local resident and veteran Mike Belovsky was moved to tears recently, upon finding someone had thrown away a United States flag in a garbage dumpster. He respectfully removed the flag, delivered it to the HEARTS Museum nearby to be disposed of correctly, and wrote a letter that was printed in The Huntsville Item, reprinted in part below.

"To the individual who so shamefully discarded that flag I say, "If you need transportation to another country, I will be more than glad to let you use my Air Miles credit for a one-way ticket." You certainly don't deserve to live in this country! You passed the museum on your way to the dump. What would it have cost you? A little time to do the right thing."

A similar incident befell local Boy Scout Matthew Fields and his dad Chuck a few years ago. They also retrieved a trashed U.S. flag, and Matthew began noticing tattered flags being flown around town. The experience led him to build Flag Deposit boxes for an Eagle Scout project, making it very easy to properly retire a United States or Texas flag here in Huntsville. The boxes are at City Hall and the Walker County Courthouse, and Matthew has collected over 850 flags from them.



Did you know there are twenty different ways to properly retire the United States flag, and only one correct way to retire the Texas flag? Did you know it is bad form to talk about *destroying* a Texas or United States flag, and that the correct terminology is to *retire* a flag? Matthew and his father became very interested in the correct handling of flag disposal, and Chuck has been an ongoing instructor for local Boy Scouts in correct protocol.



"Just put it in the box," Matthew said, "we will pick up year-round from both locations, and store the flags until we have our annual ceremony in October."

Each fall the Fields host a camporee, and alternate retirement of United States and Texas flags, as Chuck Fields said the two should not be handled at the same time.

"You never retire the Texas and U.S. flags in the same ceremony," Mr. Fields also informed us. "Each deserves its own time for respect."

Matthew said learning about the process and how to correctly handle the flags in all situations has been really interesting for him, especially hearing the stories about flag history.



WALKER COUNTY NEEDS
VOLUNTEER DEPUTY REGISTRARS!

Volunteer Deputy Registrars are entrusted with the responsibility of officially registering voters in the State of Texas. They are appointed by county voter registrars and charged with helping increase voter registration in the state. Deputy Voter Registrars will be acting as an agent on behalf of Diana McRae, Walker County Voter Registrar, to register voters. Accordingly, the deputy will be expected to understand and abide by the Texas Election Code. Before deputation, all interested persons must complete the state mandated training provided by the Walker County Voter Registration Office free of charge.

WHO CAN BE A VOLUNTEER DEPUTY REGISTRAR?

You are eligible to register voters in Walker County if you:

- ✓ are at least 18 years old;
- ✓ are a United States citizen;
- ✓ not have been determined by a final judgment of a court exercising probate jurisdiction to be
 - o totally mentally incapacitated, or
 - o partially mentally incapacitated without the right to vote;
- ✓ never have been convicted of failing to deliver a voter application to a voter registrar;
- ✓ not have been finally convicted of a felony, or, if convicted, must have
 - o fully discharged the sentence, including any term of incarceration, parole, or supervision, or completed a period of probation ordered by any court, or
 - o been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disability to vote;
- ✓ not have been finally convicted of identity theft under Section 32.51 of the Penal Code; and
- ✓ are a resident of the state of Texas.



HOW TO BECOME A VOLUNTEER DEPUTY REGISTRAR

- Contact the voter registrar in your county.
- If you are eligible, the voter registrar will issue you a certificate of appointment and give you a receipt book.
- However, **you may not receive another person's voter registration application until you have completed the training developed by the Secretary of State**, in accordance with House Bill 1570. At the time of your appointment, the voter registrar will provide information about the times and places at which the training is offered.

DUTIES OF A VOLUNTEER DEPUTY REGISTRAR

To distribute and accept a voter registration application form from any resident of the county who is:

- A United States citizen;
- A resident of the county;
- At least 17 years and 10 months of age;
- Not a convicted felon (unless the person's sentence has been completed, including probation or parole or the person has been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disability to vote);
- Not a person determined by a final judgment of a court exercising probate jurisdiction to be (1) totally mentally incapacitated; or (2) partially mentally incapacitated without the right to vote.

A volunteer deputy registrar may distribute and accept applications from voters who wish to change or correct information on their voter registration certificate (such as name or address).
